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Delivering the Teachers 4.0 University Course across Europe



Over the past two academic years, the six partner universities translated a shared vision into practice, designing and delivering a university course on disinformation and digital literacy tailored to its own students and institutional context. From Sofia to Palermo, Timișoara to Łódź, Nicosia to Athens, more than **1,200 university students**, the great majority of them future teachers, took part in the courses, engaging with the same core curriculum of ten modules through strikingly varied formats: intensive laboratory sessions, workshop-based seminars, hybrid and fully online delivery, standalone electives and modules embedded within existing degree programs. This diversity of delivery proved to be one of the project's quiet strengths, demonstrating that the curriculum works not in a single ideal setting but across the real, uneven conditions of European higher education.

To understand what students gained, partners administered a pre-test and a post-test measuring self-reported knowledge of key concepts and digital competences, and most also gathered students' perceptions of the course itself. The response was substantial: over 1,200 completed pre-test questionnaires, more than 900 post-tests, and **around 440 course-evaluation responses** across the consortium. Students reported the greatest gains precisely where they had started with least knowledge, the specialized vocabulary of disinformation, such as deepfakes, filter bubbles, cheap fakes, with several answers recording very large improvements between the beginning and end of the course. Just as importantly, students rated the courses highly for quality, relevance and enjoyment, and a large majority reported that they intended to apply what they had learned to counter disinformation in their own future classrooms.

Beyond the numbers, students' own words captured the value of the experience most vividly. Time and again they singled out the practical, hands-on activities such as interactive exercises, real-world case studies, collaborative group work and ready-to-use lesson plans as the features that made abstract concepts concrete and immediately teachable.

Their suggestions for the future were correspondingly constructive: more contemporary examples drawn from social media and current events, richer banks of classroom-ready resources, and materials adaptable to different age groups and to schools with limited technology. Taken together, the experience across all six countries points to the same conclusion: that a well-designed, practically grounded course on digital literacy and disinformation is not only

feasible but genuinely welcomed by the next generation of teachers to help their own pupils navigate an increasingly complex information landscape.

The afternoon will centre on a panel discussion entitled Teaching Digital Natives: Beyond Digital Skills, bringing together speakers from both projects for an open and wide-ranging conversation. Participants will be able to ask questions live throughout the discussion.

The conference will close with a feedback session and closing remarks, wrapping up a full day of learning and exchange.

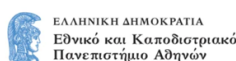
